

Embrace Difficulty Philippians 1:12-21

Paul's suffering <u>advances the gospel</u>. (vv. 12-18a)

Paul's joy is based on his commitment to God's priorities: the <u>gospel of Christ preached</u>. (vv. 18b-20)

Paul's conclusion: to live is Christ and to die is gain. (v. 21)

Embrace Truth:

If our life is about pursuing <u>our own happiness</u>, we will never find it. If our life is about pursuing the <u>priorities of God</u>, we will <u>find joy</u>, even in <u>difficulty</u>.
